Annexure I

We have been following many best practices in our college for the benefit of the students, institution, and society as a whole. Since only the best two practices are to be described here, we have chosen 1. The Award of the Best Student of the Year and the Best Service-Minded Student of the Year and 2. The Group System.

1. **Title of the Practices:** a) The Best Student of the Year and The Best Service-Minded Student of the Year.
b) The Group System.
2. **Goal:** a) Not only developing in our students a drive for studying more, acquiring more knowledge, and scoring more marks but also an intense desire for developing qualities of goodness, concern, and cooperation in them.
b) Developing in students the qualities of sociability, responsibility, and leadership among the students.
3. **The Context:** a) Inculcation of the quality of hard work among students. b) Addressing the grievances of all the students.
4. **The Practice:** a) *The Best Student of the Year* and *The Best Service-Minded Student of the Year* are meant for only the final year students of B.A. and B.Com. They are awarded on the basis of the assessment of the student aspirants for three consecutive years. *The Best Student of the Year* is selected on the basis of the student's discipline in classes and college, attendance in classes, participation in the daily prayer, uniform, identity card, the use of the library, relationship with friends and the teachers, organizational ability, leadership quality, academic achievements, cultural achievements, sports achievements, etc. *The Best Service-Minded Student of the Year* is selected on the basis

of the student's commitment to college, friends, and the society; special achievements in NSS; the services rendered in different organizations; environmental awareness; organizational skills; leadership quality.

b) Six groups are selected irrespective of the class and the course. Each group is named after some good quality or after the Jnanapeetha awardees.

Each group is assigned with the task of writing the *Thought for the Day* everyday, and announcing it in the daily prayer.

1. Evidence of Success: Both the best practices have yielded good results. a)

The awards to students have been responsible for a great increase in the competitive spirit and a spirit of help and service among the students. b) The group system has resulted in creating a sense of service; and good social relationship and friendship among all the students irrespective of colour, creed, caste, class differences, and distinctions.

2. **Problems Encountered and Resources Required:** No problems have been encountered so far in observing these best practices. The resources required for these practices are used from the college account.
3. **Notes:** The best practice of Award of the Best Student and the Best Service-Minded Student of the Year and the Group System inculcate good qualities, healthy competition, group spirit, sociability, responsibility, leadership, etc. in students.
4. According to the provision, we have to highlight only the best two practices of our institution. But we want to mention another *Best Practice* which is of special importance. And that is the *Celebration of Ethnic Day* every year.

We made best endeavours to celebrate the Ethnic Day in an innovative way. Every Ethnic Day Celebration has been a milestone in the history of our institution.
